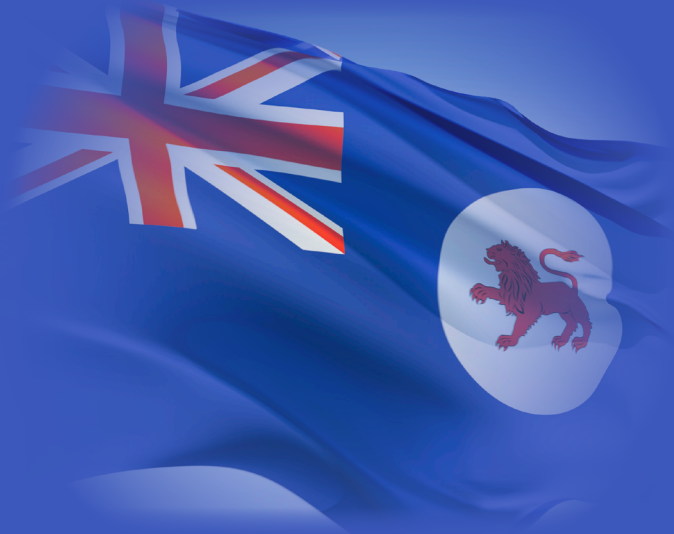

Making multi-party systems work: Governing Tasmania beyond the 2010 Election

Date: Thursday 25 March 2010

Time: 5:30-7:00pm

Location: Centenary Lecture Theatre, University of Tasmania, Sandy Bay Campus

Tasmania's political system is increasingly multi-party in nature. More than two parties are established and have the potential to govern, either alone or in some form of coalition or power-sharing arrangement. While uncommon in English-speaking countries, multi-party systems are increasingly common in advanced democracies. However, international evidence suggests that to govern successfully in multi-party systems, distinctive strategies and institutions are needed.

The School of Government has assembled a panel of academic experts to speak briefly on the topic 'Making multi-party systems work' with the aim of adding national and international perspectives to the debate about how Tasmania should be governed beyond the 2010 poll. The event will be structured as a public forum and members of the audience will have an opportunity to ask questions of the panel.

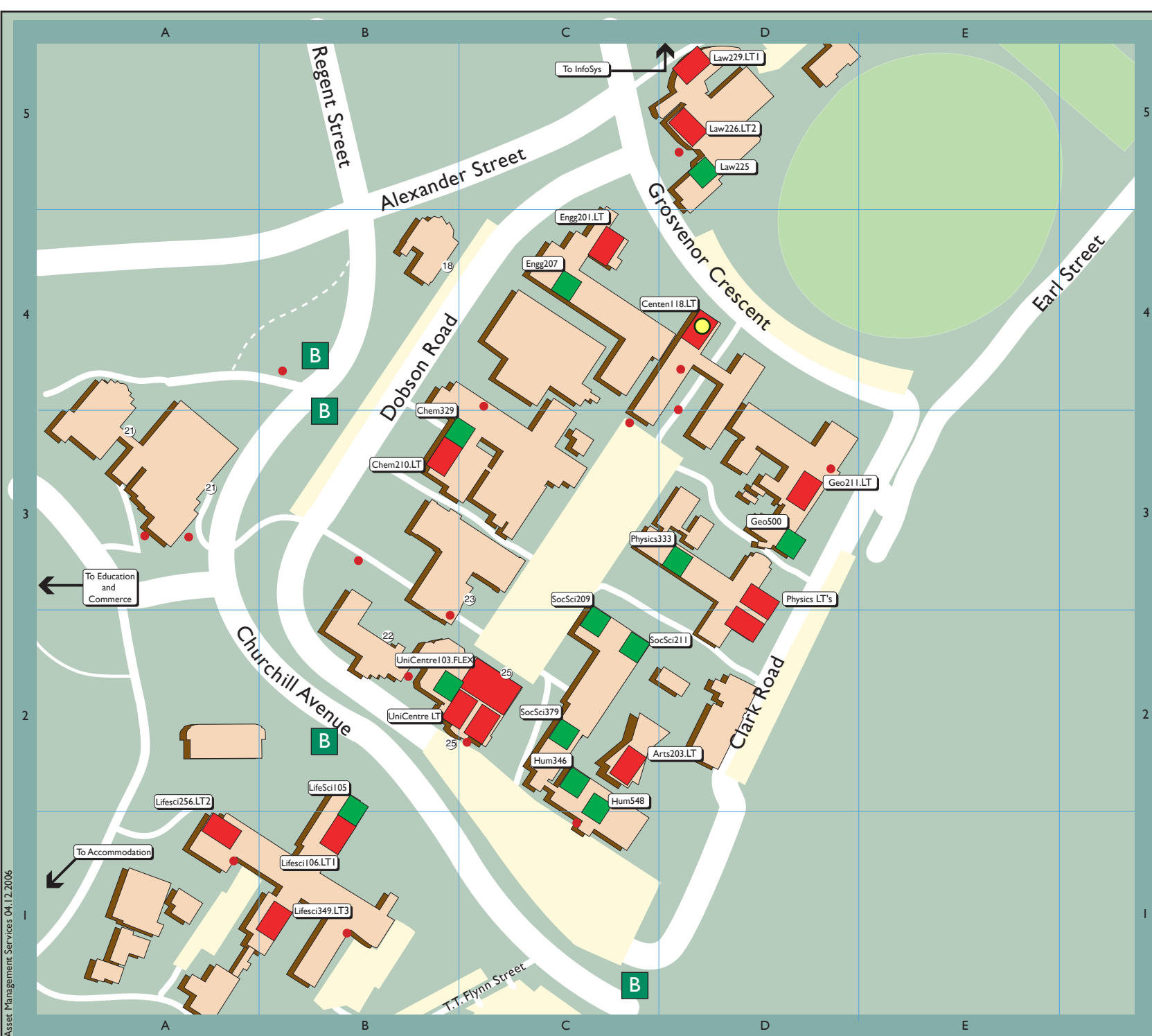
